"The mountains and hills will burst into singing, and the trees will shout for joy."

Isaiah 55:12



Tree of Life images are found in many cultures since ancient times, with links to religion, philosophy and spirituality. It is a universally recognised symbol with variations used in logos and even worn as jewellery.

For Christians, the Tree of Life represents an eternal, life-giving relationship with God.

We first see the tree in the garden of Eden at creation, where those who ate from it would live forever (**Genesis 2:9, 3:22**). The tree appears again in **Revelation**, in heavenly images of God's restoration in the new heaven and new earth. (Rev 2:7b, 22:2, 22:14)

These "bookends" not only nicely frame the entire bible, but they also highlight the completion of God's saving plan. The tree that was lost will be replanted, the creation that was lost will be restored.

Between these 'bookends', throughout the bible, there are many other references and allusions to the Tree of Life.

In the book of **Proverbs**, the Tree of Life is used as imagery in conjunction with wisdom and understanding, the fruit of righteousness, fulfilled desire, and a gentle tongue. (Proverbs 3:18, 11:30, 13:12, 15:4)

The writer of **Psalm** 1 evokes another image, likening people to healthy trees planted by streams of water. Their nourishment is God's word, which they meditate on day and night. They flourish and produce fruit in season. Many other psalms use images of trees clapping and shouting for joy in their praise of God.

New Testament writers draw a profound connection between Jesus' cross and the Tree of Life. Just like the first garden had a tree that brought life, through Jesus's death on that tree and his resurrection three days later, all people have access to 'eat the fruit of the tree of life' and live forever.

There was a garden in the place where [Jesus] was crucified (John 19:41)
He himself bore our sins in his body on the tree, that we might die to sin and live to righteousness. (1 Peter 2:24)

Some ancient theologians taught that the cross is the tree, that Christ himself is the tree, and that the medicinal fruit of the tree is the body and blood of Christ, linking it to Holy Communion.

In the **Gospels**, Jesus' depiction of our connectedness to him offers an even richer image. Jesus said that he is the vine (tree) and we are the branches. (John 15:4-5) Not only are we nourished from this tree, we're invited to become part of it, helping produce its fruit, so that Jesus' life and love can spread through us to others. As Luther taught, we are 'little Christs' to our neighbours, for in so doing we find our true identity as children of God.

Jesus also used trees to illustrate the Kingdom of God. From the parable of the mustard seed we learn that God's kingdom is more than it seems. It may start small, but is the tallest growing tree and provides shelter and homes for the birds.

The Tree of Life isn't just an image in the Bible that represents immortality. The tree of life is a promise. It reminds us that through Jesus Christ our lives are nourished, enriched and eternal. One day God will make everything right again and the nations, broken throughout history, will find healing.

May the seed of faith, planted in you at baptism, grow and flourish, rooted in the power of God's Word. May the love of Christ flow through you, and may your life bear the fruit of the Spirit so you may be a blessing to all around you. Amen.

Activity Suggestions

- In a group or on your own, brainstorm everything you can think of related to trees and life creation, growth cycles, seasons, how trees give life and shelter...You might like to create a mind-map like the one in this package.
- Choose a Bible passage from the list (or another related text), and spend time reading it through, noticing images, interesting thoughts and thinking about connections to your own experience. Start drawing or journaling your thoughts.
- Congregations might like to have a special service to coincide with their exhibition. A 'Season of Creation' service might be especially appropriate.
- Your exhibition launch might coincide with a local tree-planting day.
- If you are charging for entrance or collecting donations, consider donating towards a garden or outdoor project at your local church, school or aged care facility.
- Consider hosting a workshop for interested artists. You could begin with the devotion in this pack, and then use the stimulus cards and mind map to help people unpack the theme and excite their imaginations.

Consider Collaborative Artwork

If you are working with a group with mixed abilities/experience, or you have people who don't feel very confident exhibiting a solo piece, you might like to work on a collaborative artwork. There are lots of ideas on Pinterest for collaborative art (see our Pinterest page, "LCANZ Visual Arts").

Some ideas:

- Create a mural or wall hanging, beginning with a cross. Provide leaf templates for everyone to decorate and attach.
- Collect leaf or bark 'rubbings' from participants to make into a collaborative artwork.
- Design a collage of leaf prints.
- Invite people to hang photos of family members to a large branch or Christmas tree. The Tree of Life should also include photos of those who are already in heaven.

Stimulus Cards

You might like to use the stimulus cards on the following pages. Print them out double-sided and cut out each card. You could laminate them if you are likely to pass them around or use them for more than one group.

You can use these in lots of ways:

- As discussion starters put them in a pile and have people draw one out at random to discuss with a partner or small group. Share your thoughts with the whole group.
- As journaling tools have people choose an image which speaks to them, and give them time to draw, collage or journal about the stimulus on the back of the card. This is a great way of drawing out deep, personal connections to the topic.
- As a teaching resource some of the cards would work well as classroom or group study activities. You could use a couple of cards to get the group started, and then let them choose whichever card or image they want to respond to.

The Tree of Life is fed by a river of the water of life. Its life source is Living Water. Revelation 22:1-2


Daniel has a vision of a tree that reached the sky and could be seen by everyone in the world. Daniel 4:10-12
